For the first time, five un-sung heroines will be heralded for their contributions in making the promises of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution a reality for all Americans regardless of gender, race, ethnicity, disability, station in life, or economic standing. Five women, five ordinary citizens who had the courage to challenge laws they viewed as unjust in order to give all people the right to be treated as first class citizens. Four of those women were named plaintiffs in a landmark federal class action law suit Browder vs. Gayle which challenged Jim Crow laws. **They won a ruling charging the State of Alabama with violating 14th Amendment Constitutional citizen rights to “due process, equal justice, and fair treatment.”** The ruling ended segregated seating on intra city buses, it ended the Montgomery Bus Boycott, and most importantly it reversed illegal Jim Crow laws approved by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1896.

The documentary features interviews with 1955 Montgomery Improvement Association attorneys Fred Gray, Sr., and Charles Langford; surviving plaintiffs of Browder vs. Gayle: Mary Louise Smith-Ware and Claudette Colvin; Alabama historians J. Mills Thornton III and Richard Bailey; Archivist Gwen Patton; University of Alabama Law Professor Bryan K. Fair, Montgomery female activists of 1950-56, and others.

In 1955-56, there was more at stake than a seat on the bus. The entire future of a race of people and the life of a nation were on the “bus-line.” This social protest and the lawsuit that followed was about equal rights of citizenship for all who called the United States of America home.
